A message from the Superintendent

Dear Friends,

I never used to bother washing my cars. When I had cars that were a bit rough, or old and rusty it never seemed worth the effort, when I was working in a rural area I assumed that the muck would eventually dry out and fall off, so I didn't bother (I can already hear people tutting at this)! Then as my cars got a bit more fancy, I started to wash them occasionally, and then I found the local Car Hand Wash places! Suddenly I discovered the delight of a freshly washed car, shining majestically in the sunlight, or (more often) being rained on immediately after I'd driven out of the car wash! There is something satisfying about going to have the car washed



when the windscreen is filled with the remnants of bugs that flew in the wrong place, or "offerings from above" - if you know what I mean! There is something very satisfying about having your vision restored! But I have noticed something, before the vision is restored it gets even more murky and obscured – I could see better before the bloke with the sponge started. It's all part of the process, and soon the clarity I'm looking for will be returned!



I've often sat in the car wash thinking about this, we talk about vision a lot in the church. We Ministers are often asked "what's your vision for this" or "what's your vision for us", others sometimes tell us they have a vision for some new venture. All that's great, but I'm not entirely sure the key part is my vision, or even your vision, it is *our* vision that matters. Our vision that is supplied by God, tested in prayer and reflection, our vison that is rooted in God's priorities and call upon us, our vision that we explore together. Vision

is a wonderful thing, but more and more I am convinced that before we get to the point of clarity and excitement at what God is doing in us and through us, there is often a

time when things seem confused, blurred and unfocussed. There is often a time when we can't really see what's going on.

Think about Peter's vision of the sheet in Acts 10, before he gets it there is a moment when he looks at a sheet full of unclean animals and must have thought "what is this all about?" then God moved and Peter began to put the pieces together. I hope we are beginning to seek a vision of what the church (and indeed our local churches and circuit) might look like in the years ahead – what will worship be like? What will our priorities be? What will we do with all the digital learning we've done? There will be times when it will feel blurred and murky and we'll struggle to find our way, but in that space, I pray, we will allow God to interrupt us. To stop us thinking we know it all, to call us to share and pray together, to help us grasp what God is saying to us, and to give us faith to really see again.

We are entering the car wash, and it will get messy! But let us pray that when we come out the other side, we do with renewed vision

Where does God want to live?

"I have loved you with an everlasting love; I have drawn you with loving kindness." Jeremiah 31:3

Some time ago, we were mesmerised by a father looking after his toddler freely running around on a small area of grass close to a busy roadside. The father held his arm right over the child's head, shadowing the child's movements, ready to grab him as soon as he would be in danger. What a moving sight this was for us! That is how God watches over us as well!

When the disciples asked Jesus to teach them how to pray, he told them to pray to God the **Father** (Luke 11:2-4). They must have been very surprised, because the usual way of praying to God was to address Him as the Mighty One, or the Lord, coming to Him in awesome fear with petitions or confession, being very much aware of His holiness And now Jesus encouraged them to see His Father as the caring, compassionate and loving Father who knew all their needs in advance, and heard and answered their petitions.

The disciples were even more surprised when Jesus told them that He and His Father were ONE (John 10:30).

Now for the most amazing part: Jesus told them "If anyone loves me, he will obey my teaching. My Father will love him, and **we** will come to him and **make our home** with him" (John 14:23).

We find that mind-blowing. Jesus had told the crowd the parable of the Lost (Prodigal) Son, who was lovingly welcomed back by his father and even given a sumptuous banquet in his honour! (Luke 15:11-32.) "That's UNFAIR!" would be **our** response. But the father's love was so immense, and his joy so great, that he gladly embraced his son who had come to his senses, returned home and confessed to his father that he had offended him and was UNWORTHY to receive such a welcome.

Such UNMERITED love from a righteous God is incomprehensible, yet that applies to us!

However, we must remember the **condition** that Jesus' promise entails: His father and He will come and live with us, **if** we obey His teaching, namely to love the Lord our God with all our heart and with all our soul and with all our strength and with all our mind, and to love our neighbour as ourself!

God keeps His promises; so we must be faithful in serving Him. The hymn I serve a risen Saviour ends with the chorus He lives, He lives, Christ Jesus lives today! He walks with me and talks with me, along life's narrow way. He lives, He lives, salvation to impart. You ask me how I know He lives? He lives within my heart.

It was my pleasure to join the Silklife **foodbank** Foodbank Team in July 2020 as Project Coordinator and I am very grateful to the Cheshire East Council and the Silklife Church who have worked together to make

this post possible. Amid the confusion, chaos and uncertainties of Covid 19, we have witnessed a coming together like never before to ensure that everyone remains safe and no-one is left alone. It has been remarkable to see the residents of Macclesfield uniting together to volunteer support to ensure that no-one goes hungry in our town.

Foodbanks continue to increase in number across the UK as financial hardship and poverty crisis deepens. Silklife Foodbank will supply 4 days worth of food to residents of Macclesfield who find themselves in emergency crisis. Referrals are processed following a professional assessment of need by trained specialists such as social workers and GP's. Prior to lockdown, referrals rarely exceeded 90 per month. However, between February and July 2020 referrals have averaged 151 per month and the foodbank has helped 1354 people in our town providing over 16000 meals. Meeting this rise in demand would not have been possible without the support of those who faithfully donate food and give financially. Thank you to everyone who 'helps us to help others'.

Our team of volunteers was excited to welcome the Mayor of Macclesfield Cllr Sarah Bennett Wake for a tour of the Distribution Centre in August. The Mayor shared with us a message about the importance of showing kindness to everyone.

Fancy baking?

September 13th is **Roald Dahl's** birthday and if he were alive today, he'd be 104 this year. His books have sold more than 250 million copies worldwide.

Dahl was born in Wales to Norwegian immigrant parents. He served in the Royal Air Force during the Second World War. He became a fighter ace, scoring 5 confirmed victories, and, subsequently, an intelligence officer, rising to the rank of acting wing commander. He rose to prominence as a writer in the 1940s with works for children and for adults, and he became one of the world's best-selling authors. He has been referred to as "one of the greatest storytellers for children of the 20th century". His awards for contribution to literature include the 1983 World Fantasy Award for Life Achievement and the British Book Awards' Children's Author of the Year in 1990. In 2008, *The Times* placed Dahl 16th on its list of "The 50 greatest British writers since 1945".

James and the Giant Peach (1961; film 1996), written for his own children, was a popular success, as was Charlie and the Chocolate Factory (1964), which was made into the films Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory (1971) and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory (2005). His other works for young readers include Fantastic Mr. Fox (1970; film 2009), Charlie and the Great Glass Elevator (1972), The Enormous Crocodile (1978), The BFG (1982; films 1989 and 2016), and The Witches (1983; film 1990). One of his last such books, Matilda (1988), was adapted as a film (1996) and as a stage musical (2010).

This week's recipe therefore takes a cue from Charlie and had to feature 'chocolate'! It's also dairy and wheat free so a great one for those with allergies......

Chocolate Olive Oil Cake

150ml regular olive oil, plus extra for greasing 50g cocoa powder, sifted 125ml boiling water 2 tsp vanilla extract 150g ground almonds ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda Pinch salt 200g caster sugar 3 free range eggs

Preheat the oven to 170c/325F/Gas 3. Grease a 23cm/9in springform cake tin with a little oil and line the base with baking parchment or use a greaseproof cake tin liner.

Measure and sift the coca powder into a bowl or jug and whisk in the boiling water until you have a smooth, chocolatey, still runny (but only just) paste. Whisk in the vanilla extract, then set aside to cool a little.

In another smallish bowl, combine the ground almonds with the bicarbonate of soda and a pinch of salt.

Put the sugar, olive oil and eggs into a bowl and whisk vigorously for about three minutes until you have a pale-primrose, aerated and thickened cream.

Turn down the speed of the whisk and pour in the cocoa mixture, beating continuously, then slowly add the ground almond mixture. Scrape down the side of the bowl with a spatula, then pour the batter into the tin.

Bake for 40-45 minutes or until the sides are set and the very centre still looks slightly damp. A skewer should come out mainly clean but with a few sticky chocolate crumbs clinging to it.

Still in the tin, allow to cool for 10 minutes on a wire rack, then remove gently and leave to cool completely or eat warm with ice cream as a pudding.
