#### A message from the Superintendent

Dear Friends.

In the summer I got a new car! My old one was six years old, out of warranty and it was time for a change to something newer with a few more 'toys' for me to enjoy.



Now, there isn't anything too unusual about changing a car, so you might wonder why I'm writing about it, given that (I suspect) a number of you aren't interested in my cars! Well, what amazed me was how many people knew I had a new car almost before I did! I was speaking on the phone to someone, who said "I hear you have a new car... yes, Doris told me she was

going past your house and thought to herself, 'ooo that's different, it must be a new car". I was talking to someone else who said, "so, you've got a new car...fancy!", and yet another "Jean tells me you have new car!" By the way I have changed the names of the real people! It always amazes me how fast news can travel round church communities, and even beyond through towns and villages! Rumours always travel fast, the challenge with them is to work out what's true and what's not. Many of us have, on occasion, spread rumours — but hopefully better rumours than "Graham has a new car", we are called to keep the rumour of God alive.

Throughout the Christmas story there are rumours of something wonderful happening. Mary and Joseph are met by Angels and told of Gods plan, they can see and feel this wonderful gift of God growing. But there are others, the Shepherds for instance who are visited by Angels who terrify them and say, "God is doing something down in Bethlehem, go and have a look". A rumour of something amazing – but they can't stay sat in the fields; they have to see it for themselves. What about the Magi? They hear a rumour in their far-away home, and set out on a long journey to see the truth of it all for themselves. In fact, Soren Kierkegaard, a Danish theologian of the Nineteenth Century wrote:

The three kings had only a rumour to go by. But it moved them to make that long journey. The scribes were much better informed, much better

versed. They sat and studied the Scriptures like so many dons, but it did not make them move. Who had the more truth? The three kings who followed a rumour or the scribes who remained sitting with all their knowledge?

The rumour of God was so great, so world-changing, so remarkable that kings and shepherds – rich and poor were moved to go and see for themselves! Yet, there were some that missed it. As we move through Advent to the Christmas season and beyond listen for the rumours of God – don't miss them, and then go and see for yourself. See the truth of a God who loves you, who calls you by name, and delights in you.



But don't stop there! When you have seen this great truth of God, start spreading the rumour! Spread it far and wide, wherever you find yourself – keep the rumour of God alive! The God who created all things. The God who is revealed throughout history. The God who was born as baby. The God who welcomed rich and

poor to his cradle. The God who grew up to preach, and teach, and help, and heal. The God who still holds the world in his hands. The God who loves each person who has lived, lives now, or will ever live. The God who values every person as they are. The God who still offers life in all its fullness. The God whose light still shines in the darkness. Let us spread rumours of that God this Christmas and beyond, that we might be forced to remember the goodness of God and that all people may be moved to make that journey to see for themselves – Emmanuel, God with us!

#### A CHRISTMAS LETTER TO GOD FROM MACCLESFIELD CIRCUIT

Prestbury Methodist Church, Macclesfield Methodist Circuit

Dear God,

It's been a strange year. We thank you for all the blessings and joys that you have brought to us even in these peculiar circumstances. Before and even amongst the difficulties some have had joyful, beautiful or relaxing experiences. Thank you for those opportunities, for the pastoral networks within our churches, and for the reflections and guidance of our ministers. We thank you for access to uncrowded places to spend our isolation, for the gifts of technology, and the freedom of gardens which have eased our lockdown. We thank you for the inspiration and beauty of the natural world which lift our spirits, and for your providence in all things. We thank

you for the skills and dedication of frontline medical staff and carers and for those who provide our daily necessities even when colleagues are taken ill. Finally, we thank you for the skill and knowledge of medical researchers who have offered us the prospect of a vaccine to help us out of these problematic times.

2020 has been a difficult year for us all, but for some in particular daily living has been harder than for many of us. We remember particularly:

All who are bereaved, and especially those who during this time of isolation have been left alone through the loss of their partner. For those who had to experience the added pain of end-of-life without being able to hold their loved-one's hand, or receive the comfort of normal fellowship amongst their church family. May they know your love surrounding them even in all stages of lockdown.

We pray for the many who have spent time in hospital without being able to see their families even in their time of pain and greatest suffering. As they recover, may they feel you born again in them.

We pray for all who find restriction and isolation particularly hard to bear, especially those whose mental health was already a cause for their concern. For all who are lonely and fearful of that loneliness. May Christmas be a time when they feel comforted by your presence rather than more isolated.

We pray for those around the world facing this pandemic on top of war, injustice, violence, famine, drought, and multiple deprivation. Inspire us all to do what we can to support your healing love in action.

Lord in your mercy, hear our prayers.

Finally, Lord, as we prepare to celebrate your time of first coming into our world/ your world, we pray that others will see your glory revealed, and recognise the blessings of your grace revealed in Jesus. We pray for all your people in the coming year; that the fear and pain of this pandemic may become easier and that living and worshipping will return to the new "normal", whatever that might be. As we come to the end of this year's Christmas letter, we pray that you will help us to stay faithful to our calling in Jesus' name.

## **Quest for Spirituality**

## Updates from Helen's Sabbatical: A TOUCH OF HEAVEN ON EARTH (My visit to Coral Beach, Isle of Skye)



I have heard talk of 'thin spaces' on earth – places where people have felt closer to the Divine. Being by the seashore is one of my thin places, any seashore, but especially when it is really stormy or really calm waters. I find the sea and the shores around very spiritual places – places I find rest, peace, calm, strength, places I can indeed sense the Divine. As I look out to sea I am reminded of the vast history our waters have, so many millions of years before land beyond us and still here, so close as I walk along the beaches or cliffs and appreciate the oceans and the creativity within them. Nature is full of thin spaces – places one can find food for their soul....

The Celts were surrounded by nature and their entire existence dwelt within the natural thin places of planet earth. Nature shaped their days, nature informed their decision making, nature was powerful and to be respected, nature provided rest, refreshment and strength for one's soul. We, as humans, are a part of nature – a brilliant, beautiful, complex, gifted part of nature – here as God's stewards of this naturally beautiful and fragile world. Celtic spirituality illuminates this interconnectedness humanity has with nature and encourages us to re-discover how nature can feed our soul, strengthen our will and guide our way.

In search of some beautiful shoreline on Skye, I ventured out to find a beach created from coral, near Claigan. The coral is created from coralline algae which form large beds offshore and in life they are a dark pink colour.

The currents of the waters break up the skeletons of dead maerl which are washed ashore and bleached by the sun. You can see the beach appear in the distance, from the path and it is so bright it is like a beacon, inviting you to come and encounter it's beauty. As I approached the beach I could feel myself getting excited and transfixed by the brightness of the

sands ahead. Once on the beach I realised that the 'sand' was actually made up of tiny bits of the coral itself, interspersed with masses of beautiful shells (and the odd colourful jelly-fish too!).

The waters were emerald green and so clear and calm. In between stopping Koda from eating everything he could see, I was able to capture on video the glistening calm waters before me. It really was the most beautiful beach and waters I have ever seen – a touch of heaven on earth. And to think this coral had once been alive in the sea and now, even in death, was a blessing and a beauty to behold. Life, death and life beyond death was all here – a motif Christianity promotes and encourages us to think of the beauty *beyond* us, that is past, present and future..... Well. I discovered it here.



This thin place was a much needed blessing for me, a space to be at one with such beauty, such creativity, such brightness and clear waters.

A space where one's soul could indeed be refreshed, restored and reassured of the Divine above, around and within us all, connecting us to the everlasting and reminding us we are part something beautiful and eternal. For me it was a touch of Heaven on earth.

Through Advent, as we journey closer to the stable door of Christmas morning, I pray we find ourselves thin places along



the way to bring us closer to God, glimpses of Heaven on earth. Find a space and/or place where we can really sense His presence, His love, His peace, and visit there as often as we can in these busy days ahead. Savour the 'thin-ness' of that place and invite God to reveal something of his love for each one of us. Let us remember in a real and vivid way that Heaven did actually come to Earth that first Christmas, Heaven did become one of us, that Immanuel – God with us – brought Heaven as close as could be for all to see, receive and share.

And Heaven continues to be present on earth, just waiting for us to discover the heavenly for ourselves. Re-discover the joy, love and peace of Heaven on earth this Christmas.

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I wonder whether you ever got to play Mary or Joseph in a school nativity? I'm not sure whether being chosen to play Joseph was a big deal when you were in primary school but being chosen to play Mary certainly was when I was a child and when I was a teacher too. There is kudos, almost celebrity, in playing Mary. There's the hushed atmosphere as Mary walks demurely down the middle of the school hall dressed in blue and white and the knowledge for the rest of us that this was another year missed and not that many more opportunities to come before we are too old!

I was only ever chosen to play Mary twice and both times as an adult when my home church decided, for a couple of years, to put on an adult nativity play. The first time I was chosen was for no reason other than that I was the youngest female in the church at the time (late 20's)! Chris, my husband, got the part of 3<sup>rd</sup> shepherd. The next time we did the adult nativity I had not long earlier given birth and so came, rather helpfully, with a three month old baby boy (good timing or what??!!)...so I got Mary *again* and Tim, our son, got to play Jesus. So far so obvious! The amusing thing was that Chris was promoted from 3<sup>rd</sup> shepherd to Joseph!

It is interesting how quickly human beings manage to impose a hierarchy, and therefore competition, in situations and how young it starts!

In the wonderful gift of Jesus, God does away with human prestige and vying for position. God chose those in the lower echelons of their society to be the parents of the baby Jesus. The angels were sent to bring the good news to local shepherds, so Jesus' first visitors were people beyond the margins of their society...no one would have invited shepherds to visit their new born baby...no one except God! The magi, when they arrived, were also not those who you would have socialised with at that

time...they may have brought expensive presents but they were gentiles...no one would have invited them in...except God!

The gift of Jesus and the good news of 'God with us' is for everyone, without exception. As we gratefully receive this gracious gift ourselves this year, let us commit to look for opportunities to share Jesus with others and let's never forget to look for those on the margins of our society and invite *everyone* for this is what God does.
