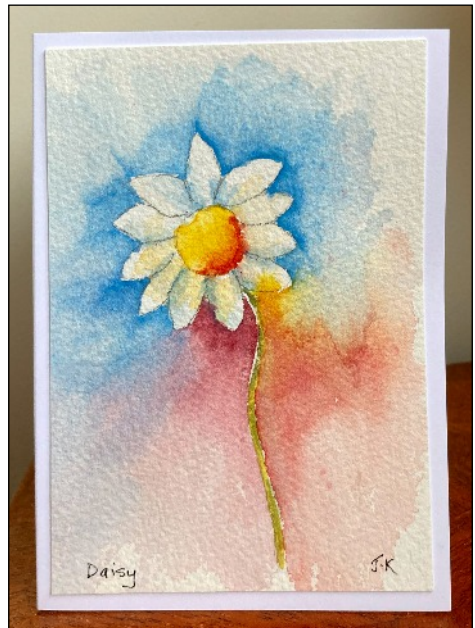

Lambs, daffodils, and deer which came down from the forest because it was so quiet. We then watched Autumn unfold with the glorious colours. We learnt new skills, Zoom, Skype and FaceTime. Let us hope this awful virus is soon a nasty memory and that the new vaccine will give us back our lives that we mostly took for granted.

The committee have been thinking of our members and have handmade and delivered Guardian Angels at Christmas and Valentine hearts in February with thoughtful messages.

The committee asked members to let them know how they have been spending their time during this period and received quite a variety of replies. One senior member has had a project with her two granddaughters making masks and selling them to friends, family and then the community through social media, the result being they raised £7000 for East Cheshire Hospice. How marvellous is that? Another senior member celebrated her Diamond Wedding Anniversary and even had a card from the Queen.

Other members told us that they have improved their crafting skills and learnt new techniques such as how to cover a chair, not just one but 12. Some members have crafted needlepoint pictures for

family member's children and made quilted playmats from upcycled clothing. One member also got into making rag dolls, 16 of them for friends and then set about making Christmas Gnomes, not only making them but filming them as a story for Christmas Eve. Another skill to add to her photography course

A few of our members got into cooking and growing produce, lots of green tomato chutney ensued. One of our members had a bright idea of making our disused telephone box in Langley into a Book Box and what was going to be a new garden gate was turned into shelves for the books, this has been a huge success and is always well stocked. No gate yet.

Two of our members have rekindled their love of painting in acrylics and watercolour and been very prolific, one making greeting cards with her watercolour paintings.

Two of our members have been involved with their grandchildren, one an ex-teacher spending Facetime calls teaching her two grandsons on a daily basis and the other housing her son and his family who arrived from Columbia. They let them have the run of the house while they stayed in an isolated part of the house and passed messages under the door and spoke through the window to each other. They said it was like student bedsit days.

All in all, from the responses, our members have made the most of this time and look forward to the first meeting when we can all be together again.

The **FEBRUARY** meetings of Sutton Parish Council was attended by nine Councillors and the Clerk. Also present were Cheshire East Ward Councillor Andrew Gregory, PCSO Jim News, one Member of the Public (MOP) and the Parish Clerk. Apologies were received from Councillors Waller (Chairman), Chamberlain and Jones.

Council business continues virtually as normal so please contact us if you have any concerns or issues to raise. Members of the public are able to witness the decisions being made and also contribute during '**Public Participation**'. If you would like to join a virtual meeting you will need to contact the Parish Clerk and a link to the meeting will be issued (access is available via landline).

MEMBERS REPORTS

The Cheshire East Ward Member:

- There are ongoing issues within Macclesfield Forest. Discussions have taken place with United Utilities (UU) and they are interested in how they can most effectively communicate with local residents and engage with a wider group of residents.
- There continues to be an ongoing issue with mountain bikers using the trails and causing some concern for walkers.
- Langley pond – local residents have commissioned a planning consultant to help them with this matter. No news yet.
- Nothing to report regarding the Lyme Green settlement proposed planning application.

The Macclesfield Neighbourhood Policing Team:

- 12/1 - Suspicious vehicle reported (blue van).
- Fly tipping reported – this is a problematic theme.
- 13/1 - Theft of motorhome Judy Lane – retrieved in Bollington area.
- 14/1 - van number plates taken.
- Reported COVID breach.
- Theft of magazine in Sutton Post Office – retrieved.

- Macclesfield golf course reported issues with ASB – youths messing with golf buggies.
- 3/2 - men seen looking down Symondley Road and Walker Lane. Same men seen on CCTV in Bollington. Nothing taken but shed entered on Walker Lane. Residents asked to remain vigilant.
- Ongoing issues in Macclesfield Forest – there to support Civil Enforcement Officers at the weekend.

Reported fly tipping Gore End Lane - fridge freezers dumped.

Funding – Informed the available funding **reported** in previous meeting is for tackling anti-social behaviour.

HIGHWAYS MATTERS RAISED

- Column 70 not working – reported to contractor.
- Hole House Lane, Langley did not get gritted. This is main access to reservoir and car park and access to advertised car park. Used to be a grit box in the past but disappeared and has not been put back. Grit boxes still empty.
- Ridge Hill Road – hedges still not cut must be cut before birds start nesting. CEC must cut and charge the owner if no date has been set.
- Leek Old Road - surface is collapsing at the edge just past the reservoir going uphill towards Leek.
- Walker Lane – surface around manhole at the crossroads of Walker Lane, Bullocks Lane and Robin Lane deteriorating.

REPORTS FROM PARK 4ALL@LYME GREEN

1. Funding has now been secured to purchase the accessible play equipment for the children's play area. The equipment is being purchased from Kompan which has given a lead in time of 8 - 12 weeks. It is, therefore, hoped that the play area will be installed in spring.
2. The Friendship Benches, one has now been installed and a second friendship bench will be installed near to the park entrance once the base has been laid.

3. Sensory garden, there have been some problems following the heavy rainfall with the drainage around this area. Ansa is addressing these problems and has been in contact with residents in Minor Avenue who have been affected.
4. Planting in the raised beds and Sensory Garden will be done in the spring.
5. The community library has been constructed by a volunteer and will be installed once the base is laid.
