A message from the Superintendent

Dear Friends,



When I was growing up, the church youth club would go to Blackpool Pleasure Beach every year. There was a selection of rides that we would go on - the Grand National, the Big Dipper, the Log Flume and the Big One. Another one was the 'wall of death'; the ride would spin around and around eventually spinning on a 90° angle, and the g-forces would stop the rider from falling out. One year, the fair was very quiet and so rather than just a few turns around and then stop to get others on... the attendant simply left it spinning around and around for about (or what felt like) 10 minutes. All I could see was the people opposite me going round and round, the view did not change. When the ride eventually stopped and we were allowed off, I did not feel well! And I vowed that I would never again go on such a ride! Even now, I'm wary of the teacup rides if they spin too much!

As we begin another new year in the life of the church, perhaps it can feel like we are just going around and around, seeing the same things with the same people and gradually becoming more uncomfortable? Perhaps we feel that we have seen all this before and we know what is coming, that nothing ever changes?

his summer my brother and his family were on holiday in Cornwall, and whilst there visited Flambards theme park. When we were younger Flambards was a favourite of our Cornwall holidays! They went on a ride called the Skyraker. For this ride you are strapped into chairs and then slowly lifted up a central pillar 50 feet or so high. As you reach the top you get a great view of the whole park and the countryside beyond. The brakes are then released and your seats fall 20 or 30 feet before the they are reengaged! The view changes as slowly you were brought back to the top, and then promptly dropped again! I think I'm too old for this all this myself!



I wonder, though, if this is a better way to look at the cycle of the church year. It is certainly a journey with ups and downs, but the view is constantly changing, sometimes we see far away, catching a glimpse of how everything fits together and sometimes we don't see much at all. Yet in all of this we are held firmly in place throughout the whole journey by the arms of God. So, through the ups and down – when it is comfortable and when it is not, let's look at the view and strain to see where God is leading us, then let us have the faith to go where God leads. Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote "God does not give us everything we want, but He does fulfil His promises, leading us along the best and straightest paths to Himself." The path God has for us may be challenging in the months and years ahead but God is with us, and God will not fail us.

As we start a new year and experience the ups and downs of life as the people of God, we share the journey together, the view may change, but God is with us in all that we do, and we join with Charles Wesley to pray:

*Lord Jesus, if the same you are,
if all your promises are sure,
set up your kingdom in my heart
and make me rich, for I am poor;
to me be all your treasure given,
the kingdom of an inward heaven.*

*Where is the blessedness bestowed
on all that hunger after you?
I hunger now, I thirst for God:
now this poor sinner's life renew,
and satisfy with endless peace,
and fill me with your righteousness.*

*Shine on your work, disperse the gloom,
light in your light I'll see anew:
say to my soul, 'Your light is come,
glory divine is risen on you,
your warfare's done, your mourning's past;
look up, your tears shall end at last!*

Children & Families

Wonder Zone Holiday Club 2021

We had a fantastic time at our circuit holiday club 'Wonder Zone' this year. The theme was 'Discovering God's Wonderful World' and what a wonderful world we have! We had 45 scientist (children) each day, we would have had more if we didn't have to restrict our numbers due to covid.

Macclesfield's worship area was transformed into our Wonder Zone Lab, where our scientist (the children) could come and discover in different ways. We explored lots of Bible stories that helped inspire the children towards scientific discoveries as well as encountering a creative God who wants to be their friend.

Each day had a different theme (experiment) using a different Bible passage. We had four different Labs for the scientists, and they would start each day in their individual Labs doing an activity together with their Researchers (group leader) and Lab Technicians (junior leader), before all the Labs came together to listen to what Professors G and Professor H (Graham and Helen) have discovered. The Labs would then go on to complete four activities throughout the morning. There were crafts, games, and a Lab challenge. We also came together to complete a large group experiment with the Minister of Science (aka Angela). Not all the experiments went smoothly (even though they had been practiced several times) but that is science for you. The scientist checked their results in their labs, of what they have learnt about each day by completing their individual Fact File or Lab Book. We watched videos of real professors talking about what they have discovered and how they are Christians as well as scientists. The scientists then went home with an activity book so they could discover more at home.



Day 1 The fun of discovering

To have fun discovering new things about God and the world he made (Bible passage 1 Kings 3:5-15).

The scientist challenge for the day was to complete two science experiments, film canister rockets and litmus test, testing different liquids. They all loved putting on their safety glasses and doing the experiments. They especially like the film canister rockets when they popped and flew high into the air.

The group experiment was to see what would happen when you put Mentos (mints) into a

bottle of diet coke. If you don't know what would happen ask one of the scientists who attended. The day was rounded off with Professors G & H

Day 2 The Wonder of the universe

To wonder at the scale and beauty of the universe God has created (Bible passage Psalm 8).

Day 2 challenge for the scientist was to create a DIY Solar System. This was not easy to do but they had fun learning about all the planets and seeing how long each planet take to orbit the sun. I think it surprised everyone.

The group experiment was to create our own universe in a giant tub. This experiment didn't start off well, as we stirred the water in our large tub, the pressure of the water made a crack, then a hole in our tub. The scientist couldn't stop laughing as professor G and The Minister of Science had to try and catch the water in another bucket so it wouldn't go everywhere. Once we had sourced another bucket the scientist discovered about gravity and how it pulls things together.

The scientist discovered a lot on day 2 as well as Professor H. Professor H found out that she hadn't been to the moon as the moon is not made from cheese. She hadn't seen the milky way because it's not made from chocolate, and she hadn't caught the sun while sunbathing!!!!

Day 3 The Colour of the rainbow

To discover more about light, both scientifically and what Jesus meant when he called himself the 'light of the world' (Bible passage John 9:1-34; 8:12).



The lab challenge for this was to make something that gives out light from junk. The scientists came up with lots of different examples.

The group experiment was to make a giant bubble with a scientist inside. This was amazing and we could see all the different colours of light in the giant bubble as well as the scientist inside.

Professors G & H rounded up the day and Wonder Zone by asking what the scientist have learnt, and if they could remember our memory verse, which was

'I Praise you because of the wonderful way you created me. Everything you do is marvellous! Of this I have no doubt.'

Psalm 139:14



I was told by several people that holiday club would wipe me out and they were not wrong. It was a very tiring week but was worth every minute. The children really enjoyed themselves and I have had nothing but positive feedback from everyone. I just want to say a HUGE THANK YOU, to everyone who helped. Has the Holy Spirit slipped off the radar?

On our first visit to Green Close, we heard Rev. John Squares preach on the Holy Spirit and the comfort and power He provides, by being in fellowship with us. He advised us to breathe in deeply, and breathe out, saying “**Ruakh**”, the Hebrew word for “spirit.”. That was the first time we had heard a sermon about the Holy Spirit. It really made a deep impression on us. It was like opening our souls completely to God.

The Holy Spirit was there from the very beginning.

“In the beginning **God created** the heavens and the earth ... and the **Spirit of God hovered** over the waters.” (Genesis 1:1)

Matter in itself is lifeless. The **Spirit of God breathed** life into it: **LET THERE BE** in Hebrew sounds like a soft exhalation [yee hee], while the phrase “and there was” sounds like another little exhalation [va yee hee]. These short phrases show the enormous power of God. He only needed to whisper to start the process of creation!

Just before His arrest by the temple guards, Jesus comforted his distraught disciples by saying that He would not leave them orphans (John 14:18), but would send them another **Counsellor**, to be with them for ever (John 14:16).

There is such urgency in Jesus’ words - it is like a father wanting to give his last words of comfort to his family before going off to war.

“Unless I go away, the Counsellor will not come to you, but if I go, I will send him to you.” (John 16:7).

After His resurrection, Jesus **breathed** on His disciples and said “Receive the Holy Spirit.” (John 20:22). What power must have filled the disciples’ hearts! And that was before Pentecost, when the power of the Holy Spirit came down on them in tongues of fire, thereby enabling them to boldly witness to everybody around them.

Do we make enough use of the power of the Holy Spirit? We usually end our prayers of intercession with “in the Name of Jesus”, but Rev. John Wiseman encouraged us to end with “and in the **power** of the Holy Spirit”.

The Nicene Creed, which puts the Holy Spirit almost at the end, and is not often said, states the following about the Holy Spirit:

“And we believe in the Holy Spirit, the LORD, THE GIVER OF LIFE, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.”

We may be forgiven for thinking that this vital statement of faith is almost an afterthought.

Paul encourages Jesus’ disciples to rely heavily on the Holy Spirit. “... We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit Himself **intercedes for us** with groans that words cannot express.” (Romans 8:26). He furthermore urges them to persevere in prayer using the Holy Spirit: “And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the saints.” (Ephesians 6:18). Most importantly, Paul tells us that “the Spirit Himself testifies that we are God’s children.” (Romans 8:16). This means that we are in a father-son relationship, with God yearning for us to profit from His everlasting love which never changes.

The Holy Spirit is our Counsellor: He guides us and corrects us, He encourages us to be bold in our requests, because “God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline.” (2 Timothy 1:7). The more we rely on the Holy Spirit, the more powerful and fervent our prayers will be. We shall be

astonished at the answers to our prayers! With the help of the Holy Spirit, we shall be enabled to pray for peoples' needs, which the Holy Spirit will reveal to us.

Prayer will be as easy as breathing.

What is more important, in these globally very troubled times we will be given the strength by the Holy Spirit to **fervently intercede** for the needs of the world.

We pray that there will be a renewal, revival and refreshment of Jesus' church.

Two short choruses may be of help:

1. Come, Holy Spirit,
Descend on us,
Descend on us
We gather here in Jesus' Name
2. Spirit of the living God,
Fall afresh on us.
Melt us, mould us, fill us, use us,
Spirit of the Living God,
Fall afresh on us.

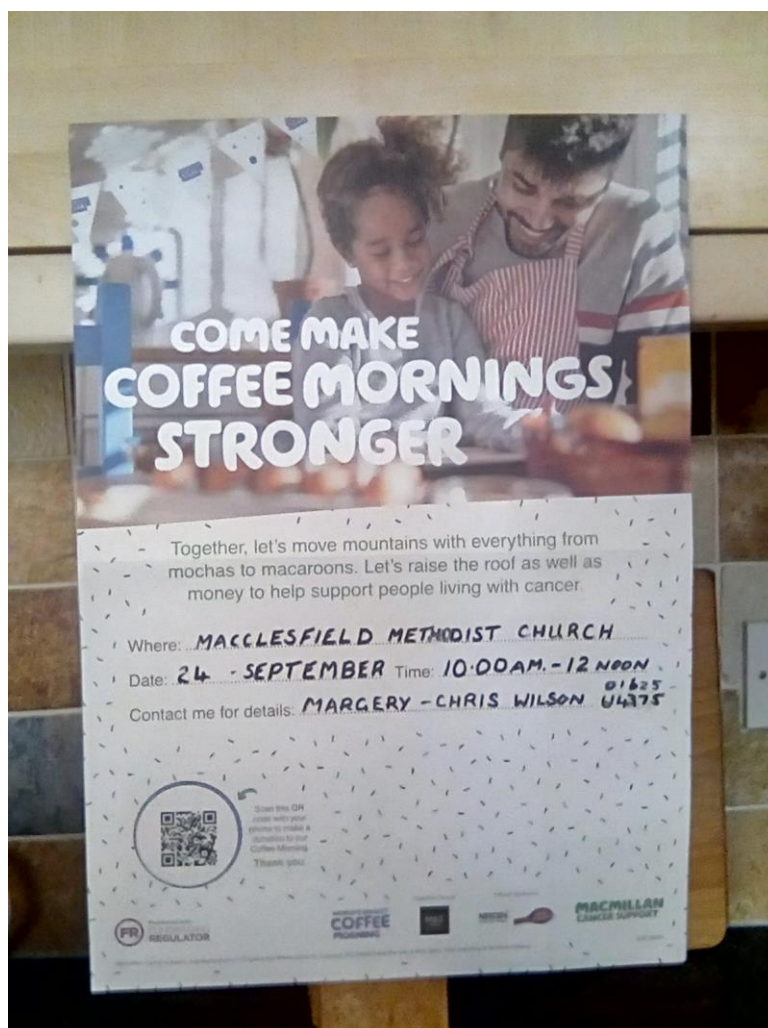
Bollinbrook CE Primary School, Macclesfield, are seeking a new Foundation Governor.

On 3rd September, the Church remembers St Gregory the Great (540 – 604AD), one of the most important popes and influential writers of the Middle Ages. He is well worth remembering, because he also changed the course of history in the British Isles. The son of a very rich Roman senator, Gregory converted as a young man, and sold his vast estates to found six monasteries in Sicily and a seventh in Rome. He gave generously to the poor, and became a monk.

Christians in England owe him a great deal. When Gregory came across some English slaves for sale in Rome, he asked who they were, and was told, 'They are Angles.' Moved with compassion for these despised men, he replied, 'They are not Angles, but angels!' He planned to go to England to evangelise the Angles, but plague broke out in Italy about 590, and during this time he was elected Pope. But Gregory did not forget the Angles. In 596 He sent Augustine to England, and so indirectly became the apostle of the English.

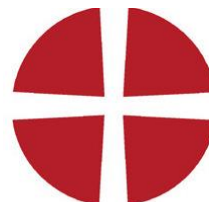
